The Cross and Resurrection The Sunday of the Cross

By Vassilios Papavassiliou Meditations for Great Lent, REFLECTIONS ON THE TRIODION. Having passed beyond the middle point in this holy season of the Fast, with joy let us go forward to the part that still remains, anointing our souls with the oil of almsgiving. So may we be counted worthy to venerate the divine Passion of Christ our God, and to attain His dread and holy Resurrection. (Third troparion of Vespers, fourth Sunday of Lent)

THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT is dedicated to the Cross. The reason for this is given to us in the Synaxarion for the day:

"On this third Sunday of the Great Fast we celebrate the Veneration of the precious and life-giving Cross. Since during the forty days of the Fast we are also in a way crucified, mortified to the passions, contrite, abased and despondent, the precious and life-giving Cross is offered to us as refreshment and confirmation, calling to mind the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ and comforting us.... Just as those who have traveled a long hard road, weighed down by the labors of their journey, in finding a shady tree, take their ease for a moment and continue their journey rejuvenated, so now in this time of the Fast, this sorrowful and laborious journey, the Holy Fathers have planted the life-giving Cross before us, for our relief and refreshment, to encourage and make easier the labors that lie ahead "

It is clear, then, that the Sunday of the Veneration of the Cross is directly connected to our Lenten effort. If we have taken Lent seriously so far, by now we are probably feeling the strain of this effort. Our fasting is perhaps becoming harder to maintain, our acts of charity are perhaps dwindling or growing cold, sloth may be persuading us to stay at home rather than attend the evening Lenten services. We may be missing the worldly things in our lives that we may have chosen to cut back on or cut out altogether during Lent. And so the Cross is placed before us to remind us of the suffering Christ endured for us.

Furthermore, this day reminds us not only of the Cross but also of the Resurrection—the ultimate goal of our ascetic struggle and of the Lenten season—Pascha. The themehymns, or hirmoi, for this day all make reference to the Resurrection, and the canon for the day is chanted according to exactly the same melody as the canon of Pascha.

Thus the Church reminds us, not only in words but even through melody, that Lent is the necessary journey to Pascha, and we cannot reach the joy of the Resurrection without going through the Cross. And so we hear in the Gospel reading for this day the words of our Lord: "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me" (Matt. 16:24).

The Cross and Resurrection are not to be seen in isolation. From the moment we see the Cross, we see also the impending Resurrection. Thus the Cross is a symbol not of sorrow, but of joyful expectation. As we say at every Sunday Matins service:

"Having seen the Resurrection of Christ, let us worship the Holy Lord Jesus, the only sinless one. We worship Your Cross, O Christ, and we praise and glorify Your holy Resurrection. For You are our God; we know no other but You; we name You by name. Come, all the faithful, let us worship the holy Resurrection of Christ; for behold, through the Cross, joy has come into all the world. Ever blessing the Lord, we sing His Resurrection. For having endured the Cross for us, by death He has destroyed death." (Prayer after the reading of the Sunday Matins Gospel)

Having thus been encouraged and inspired by the memory and veneration of the Cross on which Christ suffered for our sakes, we are persuaded to continue our own Lenten effort, to carry on bearing our cross for His sake, and to walk with our Lord to Calvary, that we may truly participate in the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Christ. Only then, having followed Christ throughout the Lenten journey into Holy Week, will we truly be able to participate in the joy of His life-giving Resurrection.



Holy Week Explained

Lazarus Saturday

Lazarus Saturday is a paschal celebration. It is the only time in the entire Church Year that the resurrectional service of Sunday is celebrated on another day. At the liturgy of Lazarus Saturday, the Church glorifies Christ as "the Resurrection and the Life," who, by raising Lazarus, has confirmed the universal resurrection of mankind even before His suffering and death. Lazarus Saturday also marks the end of Great Lent and the beginning of Holy Week.

Pancakes and Palms

After celebrating Lazarus Saturday Divine Liturgy, everyone is invited to join us for pancakes and palms. The children and teens in Church school will remain to help bundle palms and pussy-willows and make palm crosses. Meanwhile, adults are requested to assist in cleaning the church in preparation for Holy Week. Once the church is cleaned, we will decorate it for Palm Sunday.

The Feast of the Triumphal Entry

The feast of Christ's Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem, Palm Sunday, is one of the twelve major feasts of the Church. The services of this Sunday follow directly from those of Lazarus Saturday. The church building continues to be vested in resurrectional splendor, filled with hymns that continually repeat the Hosanna offered to Christ as the Messiah-King who comes in the name of God the Father for the salvation of the world. The worshiping people hold palms and branches throughout the festal Liturgy.



Sunday, Monday, Tuesday Bridegroom Matins

Bridegroom Matins is a service specific to the first four evenings of Holy Week (though it is often omitted on Holy Wednesday in favor of the service of Holy Unction) and commemorates the last days in the earthly life of the Lord. The services are called the "Bridegroom" services because the general theme of each of these days is the end of the world and the judgment of Christ.

The Mystery of Holy Unction

The mystery of Holy Unction provides both physical and spiritual healing with holy oil blessed by the Holy Spirit. It is most commonly celebrated during Holy Week on Holy Wednesday evening, but private services are also common. Everyone in the parish in good ecclesiastical standing may be anointed with the holy oil for the healing of spiritual and bodily ills. As this is one of the sacraments of the Orthodox Church, it may be administered only to Orthodox Christians.

Holy Thursday Matins with 12 Passion Readings

Good Friday celebrates the holy, saving, and awesome Passion of Christ. To take away our sins, Christ willingly endured spitting, scourging, buffeting, scorn, mocking, and purple robe; the reed, sponge, vinegar, nails, spear, and above all, the Cross and Death. The confession from the cross of the penitent thief, crucified with Christ, is celebrated. This service is long, but its content is dramatic and deeply moving for the devout Christian. Participation in the prayers and the historical sequence of the events, as related in the Gospels and hymns, provides a vivid foundation for the great events yet to come.

Holy Week Explained

Holy Friday Royal Hours

These services include hymns, psalms, and readings from the Old and New Testaments. This service is great for those who were not able to make it to the 12 passion reading the evening before.

Holy Friday Decorating the Bier

All of our ladies, both young and of age, are welcome to come and help decorate the bier (the tomb of Christ)

Holy Friday Vespers w/ placing of the shroud

The Vespers, celebrated in the Church on Holy Friday afternoon, brings to mind all of the final events of the life of Christ. The trial, the sentence, the scourging and mocking, the crucifixion, the death, the taking down of His body from the Cross, and the burial. As the hymnography indicates, these events remain ever-present in the Church; they constitute the today of its life.

Holy FridayMatins with Lamentations at the Tomb

On Good Friday evening the Orthodox Church celebrates the Matins Service for Holy and Great Saturday. In many ways, this service resembles a funeral for our Lord. At this service, the Church contemplates the mystery of the Lord's descent into Hades, the place of the dead. Death, our ultimate enemy, is defeated from within. "He (Christ) gave Himself as a ransom to death in which we captive, were held sold under Descending into Hades through the Cross . . . He loosed the bonds of death" (Liturgy of Saint Basil). At the Matins service, in place of the regular psalm reading the entire Psalm

119 is read with a verse praising the dead Saviour chanted between each of its lines. This particular psalm is the verbal icon of Jesus, the righteous man whose life is in the hands of God and who, therefore, cannot remain dead.



Holy Saturday Vesperal Liturgy

On Holy Saturday itself, Vespers are served with the Divine Liturgy of Saint Basil the Great. This service already belongs to Passover Sunday. Following the evening entrance which is made with the Book of the Gospels, fifteen readings from the Old Testament scriptures are read, all of which relate to God's work of creation and salvation which has been summed up and fulfilled in the coming of the predicted Messiah.

One can and must say that of all services of the Church that are inspiring, meaningful, revealing, this one: the Vespers and Liturgy of Saint Basil the Great and Holy Saturday is truly the liturgical climax of the Church. If one opens one's heart and mind to it and accepts its meaning and its light, the very truth of Orthodoxy is given by it, the taste and the joy of that new life which shines forth from the grave.
